I hope that you can come out and support everyone who is participating. It will be a kick off to the St. Patrick’s Day celebrations and will be a great event. The Red Mill will also be honoring the legacy of Allie McGaheeran at the gala.

FIRE TRAGEDIES! When was the last time you had your chimney cleaned or professionally inspected? When was the last time you verified that your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are working properly? When was the last time you walked through your home to just check to see if everything looked "ok"? Most importantly, when was the last fire drill you held with your family?

There have been several major fires in Hunterdon County within the past recent months. One in particular has claimed the lives of 2 people, an adult and a child. This truly is sad and tragic. I mention this only as a reminder that the chance of a fire within your home is REAL. Of course, no one wishes for a fire to occur but the statistical data clearly points out that most fatal fires are in fact in our homes. This is the very reason that you must make time and take the necessary time to do everything within your power to put the odds in your favor instead of the statistical data's favor. This data indicates that every structure will have a fire at some point in its life. Be it a small trash

fire, microwave or oven fire or a room and contents type fire; eventually it is bound to happen. That is why you must plan for this event and know what to do. Practice is the only way to become familiar with this type of situation.

Therefore, it is best that you follow these fire safety guidelines to put the odds in your favor at averting a possible tragedy.

1. Install AND maintain smoke alarms on all levels,
2. Plan for the worst; have an escape plan AND practice using this plan with fire drills,
3. Verify that carbon monoxide detectors are installed and working properly,
4. Check to make certain there are no electrical hazards such as frayed extension cords, that no wiring run through doors or under floor coverings, no overloaded outlets, or excess use of multiple plug type devices, etc.,
5. Have all of your heating type appliances professionally checked at least yearly,

6. If you have a wood burning type appliance such as a fireplace or woodstove it is imperative that this appliance AND chimney be professionally checked at least yearly,

7. Make certain there is no propane or flammable type product stored inside your home or stored in an attached garage,

8. Have properly sized fire extinguishers present in your home. These need to be easily accessible and you need to know how to use them. (Remember PASS – Pull Aim Squeeze Sweep)

Basketball Nets:

Many residents in Town currently have a portable basketball net placed along the street. While playing basketball is a great way to stay active, the location of the nets can pose a hazard to municipal vehicles during snow removal and leaf collection. Due to the physical size of the equipment needed to perform these services, it can be difficult to operate the vehicles while trying to maneuver around the basketball nets. As such, I would like to ask all residents to consider relocating the nets during winter storms and/or leaf collection. This will allow municipal employees to safely remove the streets of snow or leaves while ensuring that vehicles/equipment, as well as your basketball net, do not get damaged. We thank you in advance for your assistance.

Reminders:

1. For residents with shrubs/plants that overhang into the sidewalks, we ask that you please trim them accordingly. The last thing we want is

for a pedestrian to be forced into the street due to an overgrown shrub.

2. Residents are invited to take advantage of free scrap metal and electronic recycling offered by the Town. Recycling dumpsters are located at the Town's Waste Water Treatment Plant (2 Ramsey Road), and are open Monday through Friday from 7AM – 3PM and Saturday & Sunday 6AM—8AM.

3. The garbage collection services that are provided by the Town are for residential customers only, not commercial entities. Commercial entities are required to arrange for private collection.

NOTE: The trash cans located throughout the Town are for trash generated by pedestrians enjoying the Town, not for commercial or residential use.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

Clinton is a pedestrian friendly Town and to remain that way both pedestrians and motorists must be aware of their separate but equal responsibilities at crosswalks. Pedestrians must **STOP** at the curb, look both ways and proceed only when safe to do so. Motorists must **STOP** for a pedestrian who has entered the crosswalk, and may proceed only when the pedestrian is clear of it. **After dark, pedestrians should wear light or reflective clothing. Motorists should slow down, pay extra attention at intersections and crosswalks and watch for the unexpected.** Bicycles operated after dark are required to be illuminated with some type of headlight and reflectors in addition to obeying all other traffic laws. When a bicyclist, pedestrian or a motorist ignore or neglect their responsibilities the results are tragic and expensive for both. Every year hundreds of pedestrians are injured and many are killed nationwide and within the last year 3 pedestrians were struck in Clinton, that's why the Police Department takes pedestrian safety very seriously and we actively enforce all laws related to their safety.

HOUSE NUMBERS

Emergency responders **STILL** are having difficulty quickly locating some emergency calls at homes throughout Town because those properties are not properly marked with a street address that can readily be identified from the street or sidewalk. When an emergency happens seconds are critical to responding police, fire or rescue personnel. Please take the time to check your property to make sure that your house, apartment or building number is clearly marked and visible from the

street so that those critical seconds can be spent on your emergency and not trying to find it!

OVERNIGHT PARKING RESTRICTIONS

Winter overnight parking restrictions for this season will end March 31st, but until then please do not park on any street in Town between 0200am and 0600am when snow is forecast during those hours or streets are already snow covered. Your car will receive a summons and may be towed at your expense.

CELL PHONES & TEXTING WHILE DRIVING IS DANGEROUS AND EXPENSIVE

Clinton is too busy and too small for motorists to be paying attention to anything else but driving safely. If a police officer sees you using a handheld device he will stop you and you will be issued a \$100.00 summons. WWW.NJSAFEROADS.COM.

SKATEBOARDS, SKATES, ROLLERBLADES and SCOOTERS

The Town receives hundreds of complaints and inquiries every year regarding laws governing skateboards, skates, scooters and other locomotion devices that are gas or electrically powered. Skateboards, skates and non-motorized scooters are considered "human powered" locomotion devices. They are prohibited from being operated on any street, highway or other area of Town designed for motor vehicles by ordinance. Additionally they are prohibited from being operated on the sidewalks of Main Street, Lower Center Street, East Main Street and the section of Leigh Street from Route 173 to Center Street. Although they are sold in stores and on the internet, gas or

electrically powered skateboards, scooters or any other "motorized" locomotion device are considered motor vehicles under current law and the operation of such powered devices is prohibited on any public street or sidewalk in New Jersey. Operation of these motorized devices on public streets can subject the operator to being charged under State motor vehicle law with operating an unregistered and uninsured vehicle in addition to any other traffic violation they may be committing, **REGARDLESS OF AGE**. If you have ANY questions regarding ANY motor vehicle law or Town ordinance regulating any of these devices **PLEASE ASK** an officer **FIRST**. Also, please remember that if you are under 18 years of age you **MUST** wear an approved helmet, even on a bicycle.

Cold weather emergencies: How prepared are you?

The Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad, Inc. reminds residents and visitors to take extra precaution during the colder weather. Winter and colder temperatures bring a variety of weather conditions such as snow, sleet and ice, which can easily cause cold weather emergencies. Cold weather emergencies occur when the human body is exposed to prolonged periods of cold temperatures. The elderly, very young and those with pre-existing medical conditions or lack of appropriate shelter are more susceptible to cold weather emergencies such as frostbite and hypothermia.

Frostbite

Frostbite is an injury to body tissue caused by exposure to extreme cold. The nose, ears, cheeks, chin, fingers and toes are the most commonly affected by frostbite. Frostbite is a serious condition that can cause permanent damage and, in the most severe cases, can lead to amputation.

Recognizing the warning signs of frostbite can help avoid permanent damage. Common signs of frostbite include pain, burning, or “pins and needles” feeling, as well as a hardened feeling of the skin beneath the surface in the affected areas. Skin discoloration, from a grey, blue or waxy white to a waxy yellow appearance, is symptomatic of severe frostbite.

Hypothermia

Hypothermia, or low body temperature, is the result of exposure to cold conditions. It can also occur in moderate temperatures if the person loses heat due to exposure or submersion in water. When you begin to lose heat faster than your body can produce it, your entire body is affected. This can include your brain and your ability to think and react quickly. Signs and symptoms of hypothermia include shivering, exhaustion, confusion, slurred speech and drowsiness.

In addition to recognizing the signs and symptoms of cold weather emergencies, there are a variety of pre-

cautions that can be taken to reduce the effects of cold weather on the body. To begin, dress yourself and your children appropriately for the weather conditions. Wear layers, windproof and waterproof clothing. When layering clothing for insulation, begin with cotton apparel closest to the skin, as cotton absorbs moisture and keeps the body drier. The last inside layer should contain wool material as it retains body heat.

Since 40 percent of body heat is lost through the neck and head, be sure they are properly covered. Face, ears, hand and feet also need to be protected. Shivering is a sign that the body is losing heat and should not be ignored. Finally, limit the body's exposure to extreme cold weather.

The Clinton First Aid & Rescue Squad hopes that you never experience a cold weather emergency, but knowing what to do in case of emergency is vitally important. If you experience, either directly or indirectly, a cold weather emergency, please call 911. That first step is key to activating the resources best needed in an emergency.

October 23, 2012

~Mayor Kovach appointed Norma Kania and Travis Roop to the Smart Growth Commission; Debra Schaffer to the Environmental Commission.

~Town will receive \$3,168 from the recycling tonnage grant.

November 13, 2012

~Public comment expressed gratitude for our Town's emergency services during Hurricane Sandy.

~Annual tree lighting ceremony scheduled November 23rd, Menorah lighting December 8th.

~Mayor announced agreement signed between the Town and the Hunterdon Art Museum-Planning Board concerns have been addressed and agreed upon.

~Adoption of Ordinance to disband the current Municipal Court and establish a new shared court.

~Water Dept. continues to review Water Master Plan and the projections for the next 3-4 years, which include water main replacement through Lebanon Borough, phased in over a 3-year period.

December 11, 2012

~Walter Hetzel thanked everyone who helped make the annual Clinton Guild Christmas parade such a success!

~A special thank-you to Councilwoman Laurie Insel for her 8 years of service to the Town—her hard work and contributions to Council are much appreciated!

~Attorney for Twin Ponds, a 61-unit development between Union Gap Village and the ramp of Rt. 173, needs a statement from the Town regarding water and sewer capacity as they move forward with their final pre-construction plans.

~Clement Bonnell and son, Frank, presented plan to move the Bonnell Tavern, the historic building at the intersection of Exit 15, into the Town of Clinton—slightly in front of its current location. Plans include opening a brew pub, which is a bill before legislature regarding the issuance of liquor licenses to historic buildings. They are requesting Town support before the State Historic Preservation Office asking that the front porch be saved.

~Revaluation for Town granted approval—completion anticipated for the end of February

~Megan Jones Holt of the Sunrise Rotary announced Rotary will approach council with plans to install a new fitness trail in the near future behind Hunts Mill Park.

~Approval for water meter replacement contract totaling \$47,001.

~Rich Phelan, PW/BusAd and Chief Matheis to meet with FEMA rep to compile list of documents for reimbursement.

~Repaired chipper to return to Town shortly—Hampton Borough loaning Town one of theirs until then.

~Clinton Fire Department to bring Santa throughout the Town.

December 27, 2012

~Guild hopes to plant a tree in Town in memory of former Guild President, Linda Johnson, owner of Extraordinary Beads, who passed away December 22.

~Adopted Ordinance regarding shared Municipal Court, to be named Town of Clinton Municipal Court, to start January 2013, and be shared with Clinton Twp. The Town will share costs of a judge, facility, and administrative costs, as well as a flat fee.

~Accepted letter of resignation from Councilman Rich Duffy, who is moving out of state for his job.

~Expected four-year costs for replacing water distribution system in Lebanon Borough to be \$6.3 million—Town to apply for NJEIT funding to offset costs.

~Existing 2.5M storage tank scheduled to begin operation in January.

~State of NJ continues to push Mandatory Fluoridation systems, which would be extremely costly to towns—Mayor suggested writing to Legislative delegates advising Town not in favor of bill.

January 2, 2013

~Public comment regarding phone and cable outages during Hurricane Sandy-municipalities urged to pressure our legislators to take action regarding pending legislation and an outside audit of slow-moving infrastructure changes.

~Moment of silence for the passing of former Mayor, Town Historian, and devoted resident Allie McGaheeran, who passed the evening of her husband Pat McGaheeran's funeral.

~Revaluation update from Tax Assessor: approximately 100 of 857 residential properties still need inspection, but all is going smoothly. Revaluation of the Town will avoid tax appeals and update market values.

~ Run O' The Mill St. Patrick's Day 5k in Clinton application submitted by Julie Culley and Chris Farley for Saturday, March 16th, beginning at the Community Center and run through Town. Anticipated attendance to be 500 participants.

~Application received for the annual Sprintin' Clinton race to be July 14, 2013, the same day as the Rubber Ducky race.
